Pastor's Page

The road to semi-retirement is an interesting one for me. It has given me a chance to look back at the last 46 years of serving God through the United Methodist Church. It has offered me a chance to be part of what God is doing in the world in more ways than I have noticed or will remember.

It was the Christmas vacation of my senior year in high school that on behalf of the Conference Youth Council, I went to observe the national United Methodist Council on Youth Ministries in Naperville, Illinois.

I came to know the national youth staff, Larry Jacobs and Dick Cash at that event. Following the event, they invited me to travel back with them to Nashville, which I did, and then I would fly back to Syracuse. In that time, I became amazed at their faith, and their commitment to serving God. I was so moved, that I applied for such a job at the Washington DC office for the UMCYM. I got the job.

A friend moved me to Washington a week before I graduated from high school, as my tests were completed. I began work immediately, leading a workshop in Westminster, Maryland.

I flew back to graduate, and then on to New York City for some training.

I remember working in Washington DC that year and working with the many youth groups that came to Washington Study seminar, and the youth groups that I worked with up and down the East Coast.

I remember visiting the Watergate Hotel, and later, seeing the line of people waiting to watch the Watergate hearings at the Senate office building next door to our Methodist Building.

The years went by. I worked at the Conference Center, and then started serving churches.

I remember the first Easter worship that I ever led at the Fineview UMC on Wellesley Island. Why I remember, is that two brothers and their families attended. One sat on the left side of the aisle, the other on the right. I was glad to see them both. But, it was later in the week that I realized what was happening. For a long time, probably years, they would not be in the same room together. When it was pointed out to me what had happened, I learned that the community was surprised and pleased. It was then that I learned that God uses us in ways that we do not know, for purposes that are bigger than us. Later that year, we worked together on the funeral for their father.

Forty-six years. What challenges, what joys.

I tell these stories not to bring the focus upon my life, but to cause you to remember how others have helped you to discover God, and how God has used you for ministry over your years. Take some time to do so. It is a joy.

I will take some more time to remember. In fact, on June 16, there will be a retirement party at the Clay campus where there will be food, music, and a chance to reflect on how we and many others have been in ministry together.

God has made this life good for you, and for me. We must always be thankful.

Druss Kususi met twice during April due to the school's Spring break.

We continue to do a cooking project each week and work on skills. We made pasta and meatballs. When I say we made them – the children had the opportunity to work with a pasta maker to produce their own pasta as well as making meatballs from scratch. The pasta maker was a big hit. Memorial Day, the last Monday in May, is a day on the civil calendar for remembering and honoring those who have given their lives in battle. Historically and traditionally, it has been viewed more as a civic than a liturgical observance. So, please honor those who gave their lives on May 28th, 2018.

Rebirth and New Life

Rebirth and new life

As I walk into NAVAC each morning I look down on the ground where new seed has been planted. The ground is often wet with either the morning dew or the water that has been put there to nourish the seed. This morning when I passed the seed for the first time in a number of days, I noted that there was rebirth and new life. There were tiny blades of grass pushing up through the wet ground – a sign that Spring and yes, new life was in our midst.

Every Spring, as we celebrate Easter we are reminded that this is a time of rebirth and new life as we remember that not only did Jesus die on the cross but rose from the dead to bring us to new life. Spring is often thought of as a time of spiritual new life and rebirth as the world recreates itself with new flowers, leaves, new baby animals. As the earth warms we also often find ourselves being reborn by the Spirit and enjoying once again a new life in Christ as our old life falls away. Luther said we need to die to our old life to have a new life in Christ.

Death is the ultimate of dying to our old life and being reborn as we go to be with God forever. I am reminded of this especially today, as my family remembers the first anniversary of my mother's death. I wondered to myself about death bringing about rebirth and new life – not so much the new life the decedent has with God, but the hope and new life that those remaining find. We can always dwell on the loss – and at times need to as we continue to mourn the death of a loved one we may have hoped we would never have to live without. But beyond the mourning – what new life can be found?

As I look at my own life I see re-found relationships. As my cousins' parents have recently died also, we find ourselves drawn to each other for the familial love and support we used to receive through our parents. I find myself returning home more frequently to spend time with them over lunch, to share our lives in a way that we haven't since we were kids. Our parents had been friends since their childhoods as well as being family members and in-laws. They showed us what it means to have long term relationships. Now we repeat that pattern knowing the meaning it had for them and the opportunity it gives us to know our parents through the eyes of others, to grow as a family and share all that means with each other. What a gift.

Renewing old relationships with friends from our neighborhood and church, people I haven't seen or talked to in years, has been part of this new life. People who knew my shortcomings, hopes and dreams when I was young. Sharing from the bond of what has been, almost as if the years haven't interceded, to what is now and what can be as we look to what our lives will be in the future. No longer tied down by the past but open to what is to come.

Death can allow me to look to God for God's will for my life moving forward, as I see it through new eyes, opened by death to greater life and service – not tied down by what was but full of hope for the future, like the freshness of a sunny Spring day!

Praying that your eyes may be opened to the rebirth and new life of the season and God's will for the future on this wonderful warm Spring day!




Bishop Peter will be taking 2 month's pay back to Malek to be given to our Home Health Promoters.

The United Methodist Church was officially formed on April 23, 1968 with the unification of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, along with the dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction, a segregated group of African American congregations.

Fifty years ago, 1,300 delegates and 10,000 visitors met in Dallas, Texas on April 23, 1968 to celebrate the formation of the newlyconstituted United Methodist Church. This merger of 10.3 mil-



lion Methodists and 750,000 members of the EUB Church resulted in one of the largest Protestant denominations in the world. Flags from fifty-three countries testified to the breadth of the new reality.

Sunday Schools

April's unit was Go and Tell. It includes the story of the empty tomb, Paul Changes, Paul Escapes, The Church Grows and Timothy is Chosen. May's unit is Change your Hearts and Lives. This includes stories from Acts including Lydia, Paul and Silas, Shipwrecked and of course Pentecost.

Nepali Sunday School

Connie Clark works with the children during the earliest service at Mattydale for the Nepali congregation. There are approximately 15 children in that group. We are providing two levels of the worksheets one for the younger kids and one for the older. This allows the younger children to work on more than just coloring. They also really enjoy working on the craft. This group has a lot of younger children, so they need extra help getting their work done.

Karenni Sunday School

The Karenni class meets at about 11:15 and can have up to 16 children in the group, although last Sunday we had 21. Children from age 2 through elementary school come to class. The class hears the lesson works on the booklets and enjoys the craft. The two-year olds spend much of their time playing with toys available in the room. Again, we are able to use the younger books and older books depending on the child's abilities. The work booklets continue to be a fun way the children enjoy challenging each other. Word searches, math sheets that highlight the Bible story, mazes and finding the hidden picture are some of their favorites.

Sudanese Sunday School

The Sudanese group has between 5 and 10 children. They enjoy the workbooks and the younger ones also spend time working on the craft. Since they are mostly all in school they are pretty self-sufficient when it comes to crafts. We have also begun singing with this group again at their request. The kids reminded us that we used to do it every week and stopped – mostly because they didn't participate. Now they want to do it again so we sing typical Sunday School songs like Jesus Loves Me and the B-I-B-L-E, but also some songs about the Bible story written to tunes of popular little kid's songs like Mary had a Little Lamb – so that they learn the story through song and are able to sing along.

Clay Sunday School

The Clay Sunday School has more consistently had one child attending sometimes others show up and there are usually younger ones in the nursery. We enjoy spending time working on the worksheets together and doing the craft. All school age children participate and preschoolers who are interested sometimes listen to the story or color a worksheet.
