On November 19, we celebrated an evening of thanksgiving with the Karenni and the Nepali congregations. There were over 75 in attendance at worship. The music was amazing and the Karenni choir blessed us with two songs, one was in their native language. We broke bread together and celebrated Holy Communion. It was a beautiful evening to come together as the body of Christ.

We also received an offering for flood bucket supplies. The offering that came in was \$1000. We hit our goal and were able to present Mike Block, the mission and outreach coordinator at the Upper New York Annual Conference with this gift. This will enable Mike to purchase supplies as needed to fill flood buckets which are in high demand right now. Praise God for helping us accomplish this goal. It is good to give!

The next time you come into the sanctuary it will look different. We have been given a gift of television monitors which will replace our 10' wide screen. The monitors began as a dream and were provided for by Clyde Wolford, a colleague of mine who loves the church and wants to see us live into our full potential as a congregation. Two 75-inch monitors will be mounted on either side of the chancel area and one 55-inch monitor will be mounted in the back of the church above the doors as a confidence monitor for the speaker, band, and choir. This entire project is being done as a gift to the church. Praise God!

Friends the Lord has been so good to this congregation we need to give thanks for what God has done and will continue to do as we remain faithful. It is my hope that this act of generosity will inspire you to be continually generous in your giving. I want to thank you for all your gifts of time, talents, and resources.

As we enter this season of advent, I would like to take a moment and invite you to worship on Christmas Eve at 6:30pm. This will be a wonderful evening filled with music and fellowship. We will celebrate Holy Communion and remember the reason for the season; Jesus.

DRUSS KUSUSI -

A program that tutors our New World Ministries children

During November we had tutoring for three weeks due to the Thanksgiving holiday. As always, we start with snack and then a time of reflecting on what happened that was good during the week. We all have so many opportunities to think about the difficult things or the things we don't like and it seems important, especially for children, that they think about what has happened that was good. Sometimes this task is difficult. We then pray.

The children made red velvet cookies which they then frosted. Some of them found the cookies too sweet, especially with the frosting which is very different from what we are used to with kids. The second week we made chicken pot pie which almost everyone enjoyed. Cooking not only gives the children a chance to learn the skill, but also helps them to try new recipes and foods and learn more about what different foods are.

Every week all the children who do not bring homework or are not specifically working on math with one of our math tutors, starts with a writing prompt. Typically, they are about the holiday or season or something that is happening at the moment such as elections. Every child is able to do this at their own level and then we correct them for spelling, punctuation, and grammar. This is something that is difficult for children whose parents first language is not English. We then work on reading comprehension. Many of the children have learned to read words but often don't remember or understand what they read. Finally, we work on math. What we do with the children varies depending on the tutors available and any specific needs the child has. We also have one mother who is working on her GED who one tutor usually works with.

Toward the end of our time we have lunch – a sandwich, pretzels and dip, and fruit. It's also time to try whatever the children have made that day. Some children who are really trying to understand a subject continue to work on their skills as they eat. For the rest it is a social time.

If you are interested in helping with the tutoring program please see Kathy LaDuca. No special skill is needed – just an interest in working with children. It is not necessary for you to be able to be there every week. Everyone takes time off. If you are unable to help with the tutoring gift certificates for food are also helpful. I primarily shop at Price Chopper. -Kathy LaDuca



During November we have been working on lessons about Different Kinds of Family - Naomi and Ruth, Hannah, Samuel, and Eli, The Widow and Her Sons and Esther and Mordecai. December's unit will be Celebrate Advent with Your Family. Lessons will include - Elizabeth and Zechariah; Mary; Mary and Elizabeth; Joseph, Mary, and Jesus; and Simeon and Anna.

Clay, Nepali, Karenni & New World Ministry Sunday Schools

Classes continue for all groups – the children at Clay, the Karennis, the Sudanese and the Nepalis. We all use the same curriculum which is a United Methodist curriculum – especially important for new refugee congregations so that the people have a better understanding of what United Methodists believe. There have been more children attending the Clay Sunday School more regularly. We now often have two or three children in Sunday School – although the younger ones often prefer to play than to do the lessons, they are being exposed to our faith as they play.

Children have the opportunity to enjoy worksheets on the specific lesson and a craft. Some groups have the chance to sing some favorite children's church songs. We also work with the refugee groups to make sure they learn the Lord's Prayer in English.

Thanksgiving weekend is just about over and Advent will start in one week. Christmas music has been on at least one station for two weeks now and Hallmark has been running continuous Christmas shows.

Children are asking for the latest toy or electronic device, adults are asking for bigger and better toys, prettier jewelry and whatever else they dream about and hope for. I think about when I was a daycare director and all the times parents would complain that their child was interested in that special toy they wanted for approximately one hour and gave it up for something they found to be more fun.

Today, my thoughts go to those who aren't looking at a Christmas filled with all the gifts, glamour and bling of the world. My experience at Catholic Charities reminds me of a family we were working with. They had been working hard on staying together as a family and we had selected them to receive Christmas presents from Catholic Charities. Families were allowed to request things they wanted or needed so that we could truly make it a special Christmas. The mother asked for some clothing for her children and some cookware for the kitchen since she had very little. We then asked the oldest child what she wanted. She said she wanted something pretty for her mom to wear. When asked what she wanted for herself – a special toy or whatever – she didn't want anything – she wanted food for a good meal and presents for her Mom.

I think of a young man who recently received a raise at NAVAC. He is single with health issues and ADHD, tries hard to make it on his own helping his mother out as much as possible and trying to have the normal life of a guy in his 20's. He had just been hired full time and when he came to my door he was almost in tears. He said, "You don't know how much being full time and getting a raise means to me. I have medication that I often can't afford and can't function without. Being full time means I have health insurance and the raise allows me to choose a plan that will keep my out of pocket expenses to a minimum. I am so grateful!" The tears in his eyes said it all. He didn't care about having the latest and greatest tablet or phone – he cared about being able to have the things that many of us take for granted – health insurance and enough money to be able to pay for our medical expenses. I felt so humbled – this guy went around to a lot of businesses to solicit gift certificates for NAVAC's dances, came in on his own time to help set up for them and volunteered to help in any way he could, knowing there would be no monetary reward. And a raise and health insurance were his biggest concerns so that he could take care of himself. The irony is he works in the health care industry.

My experience has taught me that the poorest children don't wish for the latest and greatest toys. Those children ask for clothes, food, or other basics to make their life a bit more comfortable. Adults who live in poverty hope for those things that will allow them to live a little more comfortably.

There are children who live in poverty and hope for a warm pair of socks and enough food; families who live in fear, who hope for a safe place to sleep in peace; people who live with abuse who dream of being loved and cared for. God gave us Jesus so that we could know that God is with us and loves us. Jesus teaches us to love those who are marginalized; to reach out to those who are in need; to comfort those who mourn or are poor in spirit. Emmanuel, God with us, is not all about the best presents and the glitz and glam of the holidays. Emmanuel is all about sharing God's peace, hope and love with those who need it most. This Christmas, I hope each of us will find a way to share God's love, grace and peace with someone who is truly in need knowing that God came to earth in the form of a small baby for them! O Come, O Come Emmanuel!

Recipe by: Linda Stubbs - Zucchini Appetizers

INGREDIENTS

3 cups zucchini, thinly sliced & Unpeeled.
1 cup bisquick mix
1/2 cup onion, chopped
1/2 grated parmesan cheese
2 tbsp. snipped parsley
1/2 tsp. salt/pepper
1/2 tsp. seasoned salt
1/2 tsp. dried marjoram or oregano leaves
1 garlic clove, minced
1/2 cup vegetable oil
4 eggs, slightly beaten

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350. Grease oblong pan 13x9x2. Mix all ingredients and spread in the pan. Bake until golden brown, about 25 minutes. Cut into pieces. It's much like a crustless quiche and can be served warm or at room temperature.

It's that time of year y'all!

Do you have holiday traditions? Do you love to cook or bake? I certainly do and when the holidays come around I am in the kitchen all the time, this is our family hub. We gather around, laugh, cook, bake, and play games. It's this time of year that I think about what God has truly done for us and His sacrifices. He was born for us to live!!! Merry Christmas and eat well.

Nutty Cream Cheese Tassies

- 12/ C butter, softened
- 4 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 1 1/2 C All purpose flour
- 1/3 C Packed brown sugar
- 1/3 C Honey
- 2 Tbsp melted butter
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 egg
- 1/3 C chopped walnuts and pistachios

Directions:

1. In bowl, beat 1/2 C butter and cream cheese until blended. On low speed, beat in flour until dough forms. Cover, refrigerate 1 hour.
2. Heat oven to 350. Shape dough into 24 (1-inch) balls. Press in bottoms and up sides of ungreased mini muffin cups. Mix brown sugar, honey, melted butter, salt and egg with whisk. Stir in walnuts and pistachios. Spoon filling evenly into dough-lined cups, filling three-fourths full.
3. Bake 22 to 24 minutes or until filling is set and edges of cups are golden brown. Immediately run knife around edges of cookies to loosen. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pans to cooling racks.

Some years ago, volunteers heard the need for help in the flood-ravaged southern-tier. Off we went to a place called Westover UMC in Johnson City, NY. This church housed two congregations, the English and the Laotians. They did not worship together. We were fortunate to meet the Laotian Pastor, Sean Chanthasone, his family and his extended family. We worked there once a month for many months helping them to 'rebuild' the fellowship hall and Sunday School wing of the church. The organization and supplies were donated through UMCOR. A relationship blossomed and friendships started - this allowed FJUMC to grow stronger in our relationship with the post-refugee communities. Years later, annual traditions have developed. We enjoy worshiping together for Thanksgiving and in the summer at the Methodist Around The World celebration. More floods, devastating floods continue to occur. FJUMC is still helping UMCOR by having volunteers working at the UNYUMC's Mission Hub on a regular basis and by sharing monies collected on Sundays. What a blessing it was to collect \$1000. at our 2018 Thanksgiving worship along side of our friends from the Karenni, Sudanese and Nepalize congregations. We have raised and delivered \$1000 in donations to UMCOR for continued flood recovery efforts. When we have faith to move out of our comfort zone, you never know where God will take us.
